The Launch of the Panther Experience (PE): This issue



marks the start of a process for launching Reach Society's Panther Experience (PE) for the benefit of our community. The origin of the idea comes from the desire by the Society's leadership team (LT) to use the time during social distancing to maximise the benefits to the children in our community, the modern Black community (or MBC).

In debating this matter the LT discovered

a good deal about the backgrounds in which they were nurtured, and shared a good deal about the environments they had created for the nurturing of their own children. The outcome of this debate led to the identification of a set of groups for describing the experiences in which they were nurtured.

We have chosen to call our findings the Panther Experience, and the groups the Panther Groups.

The five Panther Groups are defined below:

A Panther family is a home in which both mum and dad are engaged in the emotional, social and intellectual (or ESI) development of the children, from birth through to adulthood.

A Panther mum is a home in which just mum is engaged in the ESI development of the children.

A Panther dad is a home in which just dad is engaged in the ESI development of the children.

A Panther spirit is a home in which the children are self-taught as neither of the parents or carers is engaged in their ESI development (they provide food and shelter, but not much more).

A Panther community is a home in which many different people or carers are engaged in the ESI development of the children.

The next network conversation on 29th May will see the launch of the Panther Experience. The debate will be led by **Dr Dwain Neil OBE** (Chair of Reach Society), **Mrs Marva Rollins OBE** (our Patron) and **Prof Frank Prof Frank Chinegwundoh MBE** (member of our Management Team). Panther Community: Here Marva Rollins OBE provide a summary of key things done to support the development of the children: in pre-school-provided a steady supply of simple work books; in pre-school-reading stories regularly to encourage their love of reading; and begin to learn how to read. ; in school-encourage the doing of homework, and being watchful for areas of struggle that require more support. In secondary school-provide subject tutoring as necessary to ensure they do not fall behind; and continue to show interest at all stages of education; and in secondary school-be vigilant of poor teachers who might undermine their progress. Growing **up**— involve them in a range of social and sporting activities to ensure they were never free to roam the streets (and get caught up in any form of anti-social activities). Get involved in the community- join community groups and projects, volunteering for supplementary schools and become a school governor picked up skills and made contacts that were beneficial to the children.
